19505 - 19605 THE NATION BEGINS

1. From Fishing Village to Modern City

In the 1950s, Singapore was still a developing trading port with kampongs (villages), but by the late 1960s, it had started transforming into a modern metropolis.




2. Singapore Gained Independence in 1965

Singapore was briefly part of Malaysia (1963-1965) before becoming an independent nation on 9 August 1965 under Lee Kuan Yew as its first Prime Minister.

First HDB Flats Were Built in 1960

The Housing & Development Board (HDB) was formed in 1960 to solve the housing crisis, and by the late 1960s, thousands of families moved into high-rise flats.

4. Singapore Airlines Was Born in 1972

Singapore Airlines (SIA) started as Malaysia-Singapore Airlines (MSA) before splitting in 1972, becoming one of the world's best airlines today.

5. The MRT System Launched in 1987

Singapore's Mass Rapid Transit (MRT) system began operations on 7 November 1987, making public transport faster and more efficient


19905 - 20005 INNOVATION & DEVELOPMENT



Singapore became the first country in the world to implement the Electronic Road Pricing (ERP) system to reduce traffic congestion.

7. The Esplanade Opened in 2002

Singapore's iconic durian-shaped arts center, the Esplanade - Theatres on the Bay, officially opened, becoming a cultural hub.

8. Marina Bay Sands & Gardens by the Bay Opened in 2010 & 2012

These world-famous landmarks boosted Singapore's tourism and became instantly recognizable attractions.





9. Hawker Culture Recognized by UNESCO in 2020

Singapore's hawker culture was added to UNESCO's Intangible Cultural Heritage list, highlighting the importance of its street food scene.

(10) Changi Airport's Jewel Opened in 2019

Singapore introduced the world's tallest indoor waterfall (Rain Vortex) inside Jewel Changi Airport, making it one of the best airports globally.
